Our well known H. L. Setlalentoa Secondary School was established in 1986. Some attendants from the Modiri Secondary School and the Rantailane High School volunteered to make the first learners. Only grade 10 and 11 were provided that time. Of all the staff members who are present today Mrs. Tswai witnessed all that. She started to work as the Finance Clerk, Joyce Apies and Typist under Mr. Disemlo, the first principal of the school with approximately 1,000 learners. That time Home Economics, Eng-

lish, Afrikaans, Setswana, Bible Studies and Commerce were offered. In the course of the time the school uniform colour changed from Powder Blue to Navy Blue. Students receive it nowadays for free as well as the books. Recently even a feeding scheme was introduced.

Mr. Ditinti knows this school already for a very long time as well. He joined it in 1987. But first he studied for the Secondary Teachers Diploma at Moretele and went to Pretoria Tech for School Management after. At the University of Pretoria he spe-

cialized in Mathematics, Science and Technology. For his one year practical, he went to Makapanstad in North West. After he started to work in Winterveld at the Makaunyane Middle School. Even though he knows how to facilitate various subjects, he focuses now on Mathematics and Math Literacy. During his long time in this profession Mr. Ditinti taught parents as well as their children. But he did not want to be in this field from the beginning: His former dream was to become an engineer but the lack of finances made him pursuing teaching instead.



Unfortunately he has to leave us in six years time as he will be going on pension. As a senior teacher he got a lot of experiences. For him, it gets never boring even though he teaches the same things every year. “The faces always change which keeps the job interesting. Nevertheless the work pressure is too much”; said Mr. Ditinti. His advice is that everyone should make his or her own experiences and find out what suits best to his/her character.

There have been conflicts and disagreements between them but they have explained that the way they handle it, is to treat the problem as a team and work together in solving it. They are


not only a group doing their music and different gigs, they are also best friends and they value the importance of that by helping each other in different issues.


clubs will want you to play for their team and give you a good salary. But of course you need to be extraordinary good for that teams will take you.


# LIVING THINGS ON PLANET EARTH

## Storms

Storms happen all around the world. There are many different types of storms like thunderstorms, cyclones, tornadoes, dust storms, sandstorms and snowstorms. A storm can bring wind and rain. There is often thunder and lightning. Sometimes the wind picks up sand or dust and blows it very hard. When it is snowing, a strong wind can blow the snow around and make a snowstorm. Powerful storms can destroy everything in their path. Some storms last less than an hour. Others can stay for several days.

## Predicting storms

Scientists use many different machines to find out when a storm is going to happen. Some machines measure the speed of the wind. The weather satellites in space can send back pictures and information about the weather on the earth. Weather balloons are sent up into the sky, they send back information about winds and clouds. Special ships in the ocean are used to gather information about storms. Computers help the scientists to understand all the information. Scientists can usually warn people that a dangerous storm is coming. This may save lives.



## Animals—Lizards

Lizards, any of some 3000 known species of animals that belong to the class *reptilia*. Lizards and snakes are grouped together under the order *Squamata*, the lizards being known as the suborder *Sauria*. Saurian are widely distributed throughout the world. In the Western Hemisphere, they are found near Siberia and southward through Africa and Australia. Lizards are numerous in warm climates. They are terrestrial animals and poikilothermic (They change their temperature.). This process is influenced by light, temperature and emotional agitation on the part of the lizards.



## Snakes

Snakes are reptiles that are slim, long and glide with their bellies because they do not have feet. Snakes differ in characters. There are those that are poisonous and some are non-poisonous snakes. Those that are poisonous have big eyes with flat heads. The non-poisonous ones have angular heads and are capable of opening and closing their eyes. The poisonous ones defend themselves by biting and spitting poisonous venom at an enemy because they have fangs that are sharp to penetrate the skin of an intruder.




**World rainfall**

**Connection between temperature and rainfall**

Before rain can fall the air must be moist. It must contain lots of water vapour. Air consists of gas particles in empty space. If there is water vapour in the air, it occupies the space. When air expands the gas particles move further apart, there is more space between the gas particles for the water vapour. When air cools down it contracts. This causes the gas particles to move closer together. That is why warm air, which contains water vapour can hold more water vapour than cold air. When the air can not hold the water vapour it condenses into water droplets which form a cloud and rain.

- 1: A huge cloud forms
- 2: Hot moist air in convection currents
- 3: Heavy (rain) convection rainfalls
- 4: Air cool as it rises and can no longer hold all water vapour
- 5: Water vapour condenses to form water droplets

**Convection rainfall**

In regions near the equator it rains every day. The rain results from the heat. Every morning the ground heats up. By early afternoon the temperature has risen to the maximum for the day. Heat rises into the atmosphere. These hot air currents are called convection currents. Look at the diagram to see how the convection currents result in rainfall. If you live in the summer rainfall regions of South Africa, you will know about this type of rainfall.



## DID YOU KNOW? FORMAL AND INFORMAL SECTOR

Business is divided in two different sectors: The **formal** and the **informal** sector.

### Formal sector:

- Registered business
- Pay taxes
- Have to keep the government's laws and regulations

### Examples:

- Manufacturing
- Trading
- Banking
- Insurances
- Large retail companies

### Informal sector:

- Not legally registered
- Do not pay tax
- Not monitored by the government
- Not added to the **Gross Domestic Product (GDP)** —> this makes it difficult to estimate how big this sector is
- Low capital needed
- More labour intensive than skill intensive
- Often operated from home

### Examples:

- Street vendors
- Spaza shops
- Hairdressers
- Other home based industries

## A DAY IN HISTORY: JUNE 16

**S**oweto students uprising on the 16th of June 1976

Other causes and side-factors that lead to the strike where the **Black consciousness movement** and the **liberation of Angola (1974)** and **Mozambique (1975)**. The organisations **SASO** and **SASM** organised student activism. Further the educational system, the „**Bantu Education**“ taught the black students only skills that they would use to do simple jobs in order to maintain inequality. They were not exposed to highly academic subjects. Furthermore it was decided by the government that half of the lessons in grade 7 and 8 must be taught in Afrikaans. Charismatic student leaders such as **Tsietsi Mashini** led the learners from different schools in Soweto protesting with placards. They were confronted by the police. There was no clear communication between those two parties which

caused confusion. Additionally, a lost and then free police dog caused fear. In the process thrown stones followed tear gas and the first shots emerged. **Hector Pieterse** was one of the first pupils shot to death. The struggle continued with burnt out cars and trucks that blocked roads. Liquor stores, beer halls and community centres (those that were run by the government) were destroyed. Officially 23 people were killed that day, but estimations go up to 200. When time went on, the protest spread all over South Africa and some activists went to training camps in other countries. June 16 was a turning point that showed that mass action has an impact.

# WINTER IN GERMANY

Now it is winter in South Africa, the temperatures drop and the days become shorter. Additionally we have to wear bonnets, gloves and scarfs, especially in the early morning. We enjoy drinking hot tea and sometimes, in the Western Cape, there is also a little bit of snow. While there is the cold period during the month of June and July in SA. Basically you will be freezing in Germany when it is summer this side. Because Germany is situated on the northern hemisphere, the seasons are the other way round. Due to the incline of the axis of the earth, the sun is close to southern hemisphere during the time of the year's turn. And because of the rotation of the earth around the sun it is close to Germany during the middle of the year.

That is why Germans experience winter during December, January and February. For them Christmas is definitely connected to winter. They have two weeks of holidays, usually from the 23rd of December until the 6th of January in order to enjoy the snow and spend Christmas days with their families.

In the past there was usually snow on Christmas but, nowadays it only starts later, around the middle of January to become white every-

where.

In the southern Germany you will find a lot of snow, sometimes even too much. The northern part of Germany is closer to the sea and is therefore influenced by the balancing effect of the water: In summer the temperatures stay cooler and in winter it is warmer.

In some years they have several weeks with snow and ice, but mostly it is only a few days. Because of cli-

mate change and global warming the temperatures in general rises and we get less days with snowfall. But the same time weather extremes occur more often.

Usually, especially the small children, really enjoy playing in and with the snow. Then they can build a snowman or -woman and decorate it nicely. To go sledging down a hill or to do ice skating are famous activities as well. In the mountains you can go for skiing or snowboarding too of course. It is also nice just to take a walk with a nice company in the cold but clear air and appreciate the landscape that looks so peaceful because everything seems to be cov-


ered with sugar powder.

But all this glitter has its disadvantages as well. People complain about the snow-mud everywhere. Also driving becomes dangerous and difficult since the streets, covered with ice, become very slippery even though you have special tyres for it.

Sometimes the conditions are that bad that even school busses are not driving anymore and that schools are closed then. While you might be freezing outside, unless you have proper winter equipment, it is usually nice warm inside houses because they have a chimneys or installed heaters that run with boiled water. The walls, windows and the roofs are isolated and made very thick and strong for that there is less air exchange as possible in order to keep the warmth inside.

It is really a task to clean the yards and your passages from ice and snow. Further it is even a law that the pavement next to your house must be ice-free for that no one falls on the slippery ground. The community spreads usually salt in the streets in order to dissolve the ice or they make the way accessible with sand. When the temperatures rise again, the ice and snow melts and the first plants start to grow and people look forward to the awaking spring.




